

OLYMPIC GAMES 1996









On November 26th, 1892, Pierre de Coubertin made the first attempt to restore the Olympic Games. His proposal was followed two years later by a Congress held at the Sorbonne in Paris when the first of the modern games were approved.

The International Olympic Committee was created, and in April 1896 in Athens the Games of the first modern Olympiad were held.


In 1896 the International Olympic Committee had sixteen members; there were only three International Federations and thirteen National Olympic Committees. In 1936, the year of the Games of the 11th Olympiad in Berlin, the International Olympic Committee had sixty-eight members, and the number of National Olympic Committees had risen to fifty-one, including Bermuda, and today there are 197 countries expected in Atlanta.


Bermuda's participation in 1936 with six swimmers has been followed by participation at all of the Summer Olympics except 1980 in Moscow, and also two Winter Olympics in 1992 and 1994.

Stamps and Philately have been a part of the Olympic movement since 1896, and in the first Olympics the stamp issue helped finance the construction of the Olympic venues. Bermuda Olympic stamp issues released in the past were 1964 - Tokyo, 1968 - Mexico and 1984 - Los Angeles. To commemorate the Centennial Games in Atlanta in 1996 four stamps are being issued covering the events in which Bermuda will be participating:- Equestrian, Cycling, Yachting and Track & Field. The five Olympic rings symbolizing the five continents of the world have been established as the most recognized symbol in the world, and will be displayed on stamps issued by approximately 150 countries.






SECOND WORLD WAR ITALIAN LOCALS

PART II

Castiglione d'Intelvi

From December 1944, the valley of Castiglione d'Intelvi (see Map 3) was blocked by the Fascists. The only link with the outside world was by mail carried on foot or by bicycles. The service, overprinting and issue of stamps were authorised by the Commissioner of the Prefecture (Commissario Prefettizio) of the Commune in Como in stages: No. 358 (7.2.45) (stamps 1-13); No.359 (9.2.45) (stamps 14-17); No.903 (10.4.45) (stamps 18-19).

Both Mangin's article ("Bicycle Stamps" BS8B/p20 [Summer 1990]) and Batho's listing are misleading; the "first issue" and "second issue" refer to the original printing of the overprinted stamps. They were known as the ruined monument set (monumenti distrutti), and were issued on 5.6.44 (Sa496-9; watermark; Crown) and 1944-45 (Sa502-511, unwatermarked; Sa508, 510 and 511 were not used). It should also be quite clear that a great number more than "100 of the 1st series and 200 of the 2nd series" were issued.

The designs of the special issue (14-19) are identical, differing only in colour and value. The large central shield shows a castle tower, from whose ramparts rises the head of a hound breathing flame. This shield is surmounted by a brick crown and supported by two reclining female figures. The inscription reads "Castiglione d'Intelvi" (left) and "Servicio-Speciale" (right), with the value in a scroll beneath.

The cancellation on the cover, as shown on the next page, is not clear, but is in a rectangular frame (blue-black) and reads: Castiglione d'Intelvi/Collega....syale/(date) within a smaller frame/Castiglione/Argegno - Como. Letters had to be franked with normal Italian stamps for carriage beyond Como.

Sassone lists Guidozzolo and Teramo as further local issues; but there is no evidence whether they were carried by bicycle or not.

CAMPIONE

Although the commune of Campione belongs to Italy politically, it lies entirely within Switzerland, completely separate geographically from the rest of the state (see Map 3). Those citizens who remained loyal to the government of southern Italy after 8.9.43, obtained permission from the Italian Legation in Bern to issue special stamps for franking mail directly to Switzerland, in terms of a prior accord with the postal administration of that country. All the stamps (1a to 12) ceased to be valid on 30.5.52, and from 1.6.52 mail had to be franked with official Italian or Swiss stamps, depending on its destination.

Two issues exist of this set, recognizable by minimal differences in the lettering, the colours and the general appearance (less careful [curato] in the second issue). The perforation is only slightly different: $11\frac{1}{2}$ with large holes in the first, and 11 with small holes in the second. The teeth of the first issue are much more pointed.

The designs are identical: "R.R.Poste Italiane" above; "Commune di Campione" below. The large central shield shows a snail above, a crozier below left, and a hand holding a three-thonged whip below right.

I have not been able to find any details of the service, but assume that it operated for similar reasons to Coralit; in May 1944 the Allies were still a long way away. It is also not certain how long the mails were carried by bicycle. Presumably after the cessation of hostilities things returned to normal; note that all these stamps (1a-5a, 1-5 and 6-12) were valid for postal use until 1952.

Filanci (see "Coralit" above) says that nothing is known of this service beyond the stamps, and that no used covers are known, suggesting that a competitor obtained them and closed their doors even before they started. It is not listed in Sassone.

The USA 1902-1917 special delivery issues. The Special Delivery Bicycle Messenger comes into being.


For seventeen years, the portrait of young Edward Pawling graced the design of the first United States special delivery stamp and the next four issues. In 1902, R. Ostrander Smith, a noted Bureau of Engraving and Printing designer, mounted a contemporary bicycle as was then employed by the Special Delivery Section of the Post Office and rode into philatelic history, appearing on five Scott denominated special delivery stamps of the United States. The original photograph is illustrated from my collection.



Ostrander Smith designed the stamp from the photograph and did at least two pen and ink sketches, one of which, without distinct background, is illustrated on the next page; both are in my collection.

The bicycle stamp had a most intriguing history. Initially, four plates were made from the Bureau Die, 1481-2-3-4. After much use, plates 1773-4-5-6 were laid down. The earlier plates began to disintegrate, creating some worn plate printings, as well as some double transfers and missing entries in plates 1483 and 1484, in the bottom row. Those varieties are well illustrated and described in the Cloudy French book published by the Bureau Issues Association and just seen by me through the courtesy of Bert Schapelhouman. The worn plate does not illustrate well but it is a very pale milky blue, almost fuzzy. It is reported that two sheets were found in the Boston, Massachusetts, post office.

The design continued in use from 1902 to 1908, when the famous "Merry Widow" or Helmet of Mercury special delivery stamp came out. While a lovely green colour was chosen for this neat stamp (my personal favourite), the powers that be hated it, claiming that it was constantly mistaken for a one cent stamp and did not get the appropriate service. In 47 years of collecting this particular stamp, I never saw such a use, but what do I know? Politicians even to this day do not tell the full story when they want to take some action.



When this stamp was withdrawn, officially on June 9, 1909, by Postmaster order, it was not demonetised, but the Bureau of Engraving and Printing was directed to re-issue the 1902 bicycle messenger stamp. The Bureau laid down plates 5240-43-44 and -45. These plates were not to press. My records have the dates to press of all of these plates which, if the information would be useful, will gladly be supplied. A major philatelic expert, writer and lecturer, became alarmed that the philatelic public would not be able to distinguish the re-issue from the initial issue and, in an article in the philatelic press, implored the Postmaster to correct the sin. The Postmaster and the Bureau accommodated the public by adding the suffix -09 to each of these 5200 series plates. Merely by looking at the plate number on the re-issue sheets could one know that the stamps were the re-issue. There appears to be no difference between the earlier stamps and the later issue. Morris finally realised this and published his apology and announced his mistake in print, of course in a British journal with nominal United States circulation, but the deed had been accomplished.

What about the re-issue plates? The ones without the -09 are ten times rarer than the ones with the -09. One is talking about a \$2500 plate block of six for the -09 plate of this number, so rarity is a question of one's own judgement. All four numbers have the -09, in top and bottom positions. The only other time I recall such an instance was on the one cent Official Executive plate for the specimens, where plate 81 was engraved on the margin. When it was realised by the American Bank Note Company that the plate had already been issued to the 30c denomination of the War Department, the engraver merely crossed it out, and next to it added the new number 82. (Who cared, these stamps are only for official use, and would not even be used at that because they were distributed by Congressmen to their constituents, in the main, but that is another story. See my Capex Gold Medal exhibit if you care to learn more or see more.)

The same design also is known in the 1911, 1914, 1916 and 1917 issues of the United States, Scott E8,9,10 & 11. The only differences were in the papers, with and without watermarks, and the perforation sizes. Plate 5520 was laid down and saw service printing all of these stamps, one of the most lengthy uses of a plate in American philatelic history (it is very difficult to obtain in all four issues but I have done it). The plate bears an imprint of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing and is neat in that respect.

Years ago, I wrote an article for the Bureau Specialist, listing all of the plate numbers for the special delivery stamps, winning their coveted Hopkinson Award. Separate studies in the 1902 issue, and its successors, allow the postal historian to analyse the Post Office Clock receiving markings from Boston, and the non-delivery labels (at least 30 series are known) from the New York City post office, and a few from Brooklyn and Boston, as well.

The 1902 issue also contains the greatest rarity of Bicycle philately, I believe. In 1907, plate 1774 was put back on the press for a special printing for the Bureau of Insular Affairs, for the PHILIPPINES, and an overprint was created. Supposedly two sheets were laid down but I know of only two bottom plate blocks, one of eight and one of six. I illustrate the plate of six from my collection. At one time, I duplicated the feat of W. Parsons Todd, a special delivery enthusiast, who owned both of these plates, courtesy of J. Murray Bartels, the Washington dealer who was Fodd's curator of philately. But this remains for another story. The trial colour proofs are marvellous and these will also be separately discussed.

I have only collected special delivery of the United States since 1957 and of the world since 1962. I have helped build the four greatest collections of this material and have seen the material which two unthinking collectors, William Learned Law Peltz and Henry Morriss donated to a non-philatelic museum, where the material is so rarely seen that dust accumulates on the albums. I have only seen the collections twice. These properties make for an interesting future story.

The collecting of worldwide special delivery stamps and covers also offers a lot of overlap in your field, and correspondence is not only welcome but happily answered; photocopies of covers and unusual (not mint or used singles) proofs, essays, of the like are really appreciated for my research. Maybe, just maybe, something would be offered in return.

BRITISH POST OFFICE STRIKES

By A.E.TEIDEMAN from information supplied by Ivan Trinder and extract from LINN'S

Over a period of 8 years since the 1988 strike, the threat of privatisation of the British P.O has been forever present. This threat was first suggested by Sir Keith Joseph in the early 1980's, but was not proceeded with. The P.O. settled for allowing carriers to deliver mail but the minimum charge had to be one Pound per item. This ruled out ordinary letter delivery, on cost alone, but as inflation ate into the value of the Pound, this charge by 1996 seemed not to be out of the question.

THE COLCHESTER & DISTRICT MESSENGER SERVICE

In order to be prepared for action should the occasion arise, the C & DMS envisaged that deliveries could be operated as in the 1971 strike. The Stamps printed were in the 'No Value Indicated' category, as charges could not be decided until the stamps were needed.

THE 1996 SERIES OF P.O. STRIKES

In 'The Times' of Friday June 14th, Phillip Bassett reported that a one-day strike would be called for Friday June 21st. This was duly called and mail boxes were sealed for that day. This was followed by another strike when work ceased on Thursday June 27th at 12 noon, the boxes were reopened at 1 noon on Friday June 28th.

The Times' on Saturday July 18th reported that Ian Lang, President of the Board of Trade had given notice that he would suspend the P.O's. monopoly and allow carriers to carry and deliver letters for less than the one Pound previously stipulated. The next strike took place on July 18th and 19th. On the 19th the Prime Minister Issued an ultimatum to the P.O. workers, that if another 36hr strike took place as was planned, he would waive the P.O's. monopoly for an experimental period of one month. This at first did not seem necessary as a settlement was agreed on, but it did not last long!!

Linn's August 10th issue stated:

British monopoly ends


Royal Mail (the British Post Office) will suspend its monopoly on delivering letters for one month in response to four recent postal workers' strikes, according to a report from Reuters, a British news agency.

One report began: "The government said on Monday (Aug. 5), it would suspend at midnight the letter monopoly enjoyed by Britain's Royal Mail since it issued the world's first postage stamp in 1840, after a postal union called five new strikes."

lan Lang, Great Britain's Trade and Industry secretary, reported that private companies will be able to compete with Royal Mail for mail deliveries costing less than 1 pound (US\$1.54).

If the strikes by the Communication Workers Union continue, the suspension may be extended for an additional three months.

According to Reuters, Royal Mail previously suspended its postal monopoly in 1971, also because of strikes.





The C & DMS stamps and envelopes were surcharged as follows:

1. (50p) - Gold, overprinted STRIKE POST 50p in violet. (320)


2. (PS1) - Red on yellow paper, overprinted STRIKE POST PS1 in dark blue. (280)

3. (PS2) - Black on green paper, overprinted STRIKE POST PS2 in orange. (360)

4. (PS1) - Postal stationery envelope, Red, overprinted STRIKE POST PS1 in dark blue. (50)

Illustrated envelopes (example above, postmarked 19 Jul 1996) were produced on a strike theme (50), bearing a PS2 strike stamp and the new 20p second class stamp in addition. These covers were posted at various MLO's. In addition, 150 were stamped with strike stamps only.

In 1934 Georges Matthys organized the first Ghent-Wevelgem for juniors. Starting in 1936 the race was for semi-professionals. In 1945 it was opened to professionals and the winner was Robert van Eename, which seems appropriate since he had won twice as an independent. Matthys' claimed intention was to attract the highest quality field possible. He has succeeded outstandingly, with a record of 258 starters in 1985, beaten only by the all-time record of 260 in Milan-San Remo.

Ghent-Wevelgem, sponsored now by Het Laatste Nieuws, another Belgian newspaper, is similar in profile to Het Volk and the Tour of Flanders, though less severe. It starts into the prevailing wind, traveling west from Ghent to the coast, which it follows almost to the French border. It then follows the border south to Poperinge, where the hilly section starts. There are usually five or six classified climbs, some of them ridden two or three times, then a flat run of some 30 miles to the finish. Matthys points out that while the race is often criticized as being designed for sprinters, there have been only three mass sprint wins in its history.

Despite its popularity with foreign riders, Ghent-Wevelgem was dominated for a long time by Belgians, whose victories were punctuated only by the surprising success of Swiss Rolf Graf in 1954. It was another 10 years to the next foreign victory, and an amazing one it was. The story is told in Anquetil written by Jacques Anquetil's wife and Pierre Chany (Hatier, 1971). Anquetil was near the back of the bunch, alongside a Belgian. Anquetil asked how far it was to the finish and was told just over two miles. "This was the signal. He jumped from the back and surprised all the Belgian roadmen-sprinters, including (Rik) van Looy and his red guards." In fact, Anquetil won by one second and, had the line been 100 yards further, he would have been closer to 50th than first.

Ten more years passed and, again, victory could hardly have been more surprising. The GAN-Mercier team was in fine form, with Joop Zoetemelk winning Paris-Nice and Cees Bal taking the Tour of Flanders, and with Raymond Poulidor on board. Then there was their rival, Eddy Merckx, a three-time winner like van Looy. Merckx needed only one more victory to be the record-holder, and the Flemish riders were out to stop him.

Nothing significant happened by the Kemmelberg, climbed twice, once in each direction. Roger de Vlaeminck led over the top the first time, ahead of Merckx and Frans Verbeeck, with Verbeeck taking the honors the second time. The bunch had split, but the gaps were not large and Barry Hoban, about 200 yards down at the summit, was paced back by teammate Poulidor, who was returning the help often given him in the Tour de France. Then Herman van Springel jumped and Poulidor fetched him back. The top Belgian sprinters were all at the front waiting for the finish, but Poulidor sat on every attempt to break away.

The lead bunch approached the line intact. Merckx was there with Roger Swerts to lead him out. De Vlaeminck and others were there, too. Eric Leman jumped too early. Walter Godefroot took the wrong wheel and found himself balked. As they neared the finish it seemed that Merckx and de Vlaeminck would fight it out, but suddenly a GAN-Mercier jersey appeared between the two leaders and, with an elbow-stretching lunge, Hoban took the win.


The most significant foreign victory took place in 1977, over a different course than usual. The field was smashed on the dreaded Koppenberg, followed by the Kwatchiont and the Kruisberg. Seven men broke away and built up a four-minute lead, but it was wiped out on the Kemmelberg, climbed twice as usual. With 20 miles to go, another seven emerged from the new lead group to contest the Mont Rouge. They, too, were caught, but not before Bernard Hinault jumped away alone. After surviving the hilliest Ghent-Wevelgem ever he time trialed his way to a 1:24 victory. Daniel Schamps, reporting the race for *International Cycle Sport*, asked "could France have a new Anquetil?" Yes indeed—and a lot more.

THE FRESNO & SAN FRANCISCO BICYCLE MAIL OF 1894

Brian Sole has found differences between an advertising letter sent out by Arthur C. Banta, illustrated in Lowell B. Cooper's book, and the copy in his collection. Part of his letter is printed below, together with a portion of page 37 of Cooper's book.

In Lowell B Cooper's Book "The Fresno and San Francisco Bicycle Mail of 1894 there is an illustration on page 37 of an Advertising Letter sent out by Banta. Only recently did I mount a similar item into my collection. It had come from a Cinderella collector about 3 years ago. The letter in the book is almost identical to my copy except that mine is dated by rubber stamp Aug 6 1894 whereas the item in the book isdated Jul 28 1894. However my letter bears a copy of the amended stamp (with large C amended from an S in the word Francisco). The illustration in the book shows the diamond stamp with the incorrect spelling of Fransisco. This raises the question Was the stamp on my letter substited at some time or did Banta send out a second letter dated Aug 6 1894 to various dealers etc with the amended / corrected wording?

I would be grateful if you could enquire through Bicycle Stamps if other collectors have copies of either letter or even with letters similar in content but with different dates. A colour photocopy of my letter is enclosed.
